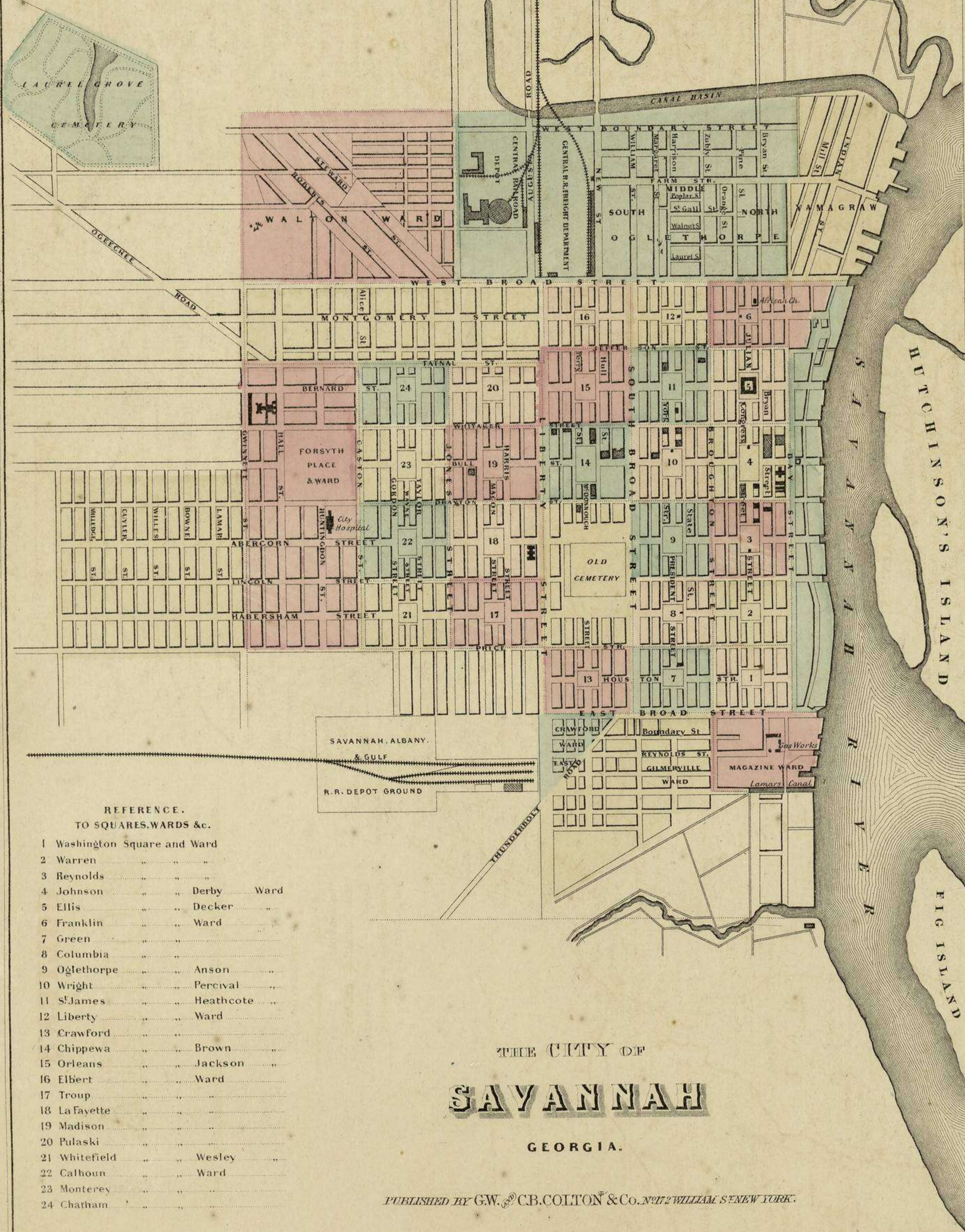


NOTE.

Savannah was first settled in February 1733 by General James Oglethorpe and some 30 families. In 1741 the government was changed from bailiffs to trustees. The state legislature passed a law making Savannah a city in 1789. The British made their first attack upon the city on March 3<sup>d</sup> 1776 in which they were defeated; on the 29<sup>th</sup> December 1778 Savannah was again attacked and captured, an unsuccessful attempt was made to recapture the city from the British by the French and American army in October 1779, in this attack Putaski fell; Savannah was formally given up by the British to the Americans July 1783.

The Plans of Savannah & Charleston are upon the same Scale.

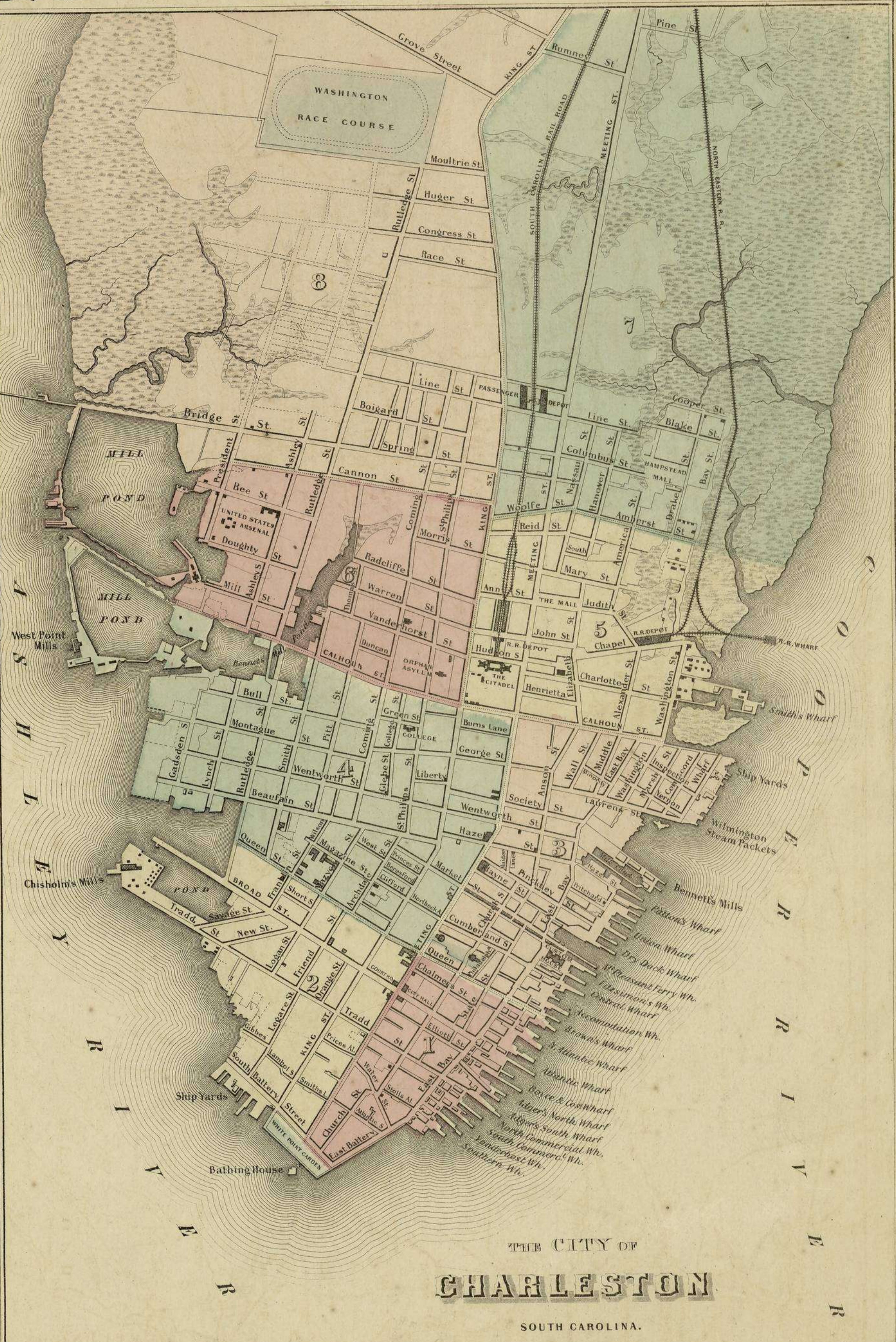
