This Noble and Ancient Cathedral was founded in the Beginning of the Reign of King Henry the 3<sup>d</sup> by Bishop Richard Poor (who laid the first Stone on the Calends of May 1220) in a Place called Mery Field, part of his own Estate, in a low Situation, near the Confluence of the Avon and Nadder. It was finished and dedicated to our Lady in the Presence of Henry the 3<sup>d</sup> by Bishop Giles Bricpote, on the Feast of St. Michael 1258. The Edifice is large and magnificent, built in the form of a Croze, on the Intersection of which stand a Tower and Spire of Stone 400 Feet in height, (which is twice the height of the Monument, and 10 Feet higher than St. Paul's in London) and are supported by four Pillars 60 Feet high, of Purbeck Marble, of the same kind with those in the Temple Church in London. The length of the Nave is 200 Feet, the breadth 45 and the height 80 Feet. The side Sills in height and breadth are just half the Dimensions of the Nave, and the whole Structure is admirably proportioned. The outside Dimensions are 100 Feet to the top of the Purbeck Wall, which is the most beautiful of its kind in Europe; and to the top of the Roof. The whole length is 470 Feet. On the South Side is a spacious Cloyster, and over the East Part of it a large Library with a Chapter House adjoining. The Gates and Chappels of this sumptuous Fabric agree in Number, each to the Months of the Year, the Windows to the Days, and the Pillars to the Hours.
